





Time restrictions on screen



A definition

Screens are everywhere in our daily life, from TV to computers, from smartphones to tablets. Such technology impacts the lives of both adults and children.



Why is this important?

According to the <u>Kaiser Family Foundation</u>, people aged 8-18 spend, on average, 7.5 hours in front of a screen for entertainment each day, 4.5 of which are spent watching TV. The problem is that long exposure to screens may have an impact on mental and physical health. International recommendations suggest not exposing children to more than 2 hours per day.



Tips and tricks

- Encourage active screen time: active learning doesn't have the same negative impact.
- Be a role model: show your children that you are not always using digital devices.
- Set time control: establish rules to regulate the screen exposure of your children.
- Encourage other activities: reading books, playing together, spending time outdoors.
